Oscar DeGruy, a youth advocate with over 40 years experience as an actor, public speaker, workshop creator, facilitator and mentor, has been invited by the Local Spiritual Assembly of the Baha'is of Las Vegas to offer Arts Empowerment to support the JYSEP programs in our cluster. Oscar utilizes performing arts to boost youth self-esteem, encourage self-discipline and increase social awareness. His techniques will also support the Animators/Teachers who work with youth, as well as inspire expression and transformation in the areas of race and ethnicity, gender inequality, violence and substance abuse.



What happens?



The primary focus in on junior youth between the ages of 11 and 15. This is a crucial period of a junior youth's life as their consciousness is expanding and, day by day, they are becoming increasingly exposed to the forces of society.

Older youth are invited to participate in the arts empowerment activities as well as participating in a Ruhi Book 5 intensive to become an "Animator". The role of an Animator is to assist the junior youth in developing their capacities, encouraging them to contribute to the betterment of society as well as encouraging them to question the world around them. Most importantly, an Animator must strive to become a true friend to the junior youth.

Adults, particularly Teachers who want to learn performing arts tools to use with your education programs are welcome to join. Oscar will have special insight into the why's and how's of working with youth, and give you valuable insight you may use in your own creative ways.

More about Oscar DeGruy

Oscar DeGruy is a professional actor and in his early acting career he is known for his role as a regular on The New Bill Cosby Show for the 1972 -73 season. He appeared in shows as diverse as Room 222 to Hill Street Blues. His first role was on The Young Lawyers in 1970 and in 2008 he completed work as a supporting actor in Zero Option based on a true story.

Ever Wonder What Happened to "Mad Dog" on "Good Times"

In Good Times in 1974 DeGruy was featured in a two-part episode "JJ and the Gang". JJ is forced into a gang led by Mad Dog (DeGruy) who wounds JJ. After the trial Mad Dog is confronted by his mother who confesses "I never thought I could feel this way about my child, but I hate you" and the two exchange emotional arguments over the missing husband/father. JJ's father, James, ultimately feels sympathy for Mad Dog witnessing the family argument over the absent father.



The Baha'i Youth Workshop

A former member of the Black Panthers, Oscar DeGruy changed his approach to racism issues and "had to do something" - so in the late 1970s he and his wife combined performing theatre arts with step dance and street dancing to portray the Bahá'í principles of equality, racial harmony and the unity of religions.

This approach to performing arts and social responsibility transformed and inspired youth around the country and around the world to contribute to the betterment of society.

In 1995 there were over 100 Workshops in the United States, and another 100 scattered across 50 other countries.



Over 1000 such Workshops have formed over the years, some of which have toured internationally and still exist today.
